## World War One Part One, Causes of the Great War

## The Balkans Crossroads of Conflict

A century has passed since the events which lead to The Great War of Civilization better known as the First World War. Most people know that about the assassination in Sarajevo of Archduke Franz Ferdinand the heir to the Austro-Hungarian throne. The assassination of the Arch Duke and his wife Sophie by Gavrilo Princip a



Bosnian and a group of Serbs conspirators prompted Austria-Hungary to issue an ultimatum to Serbia which in part was rejected. The rejection caused the Austro-Hungarian Empire to declare war on Serbia. The war between Austria-Hungry and Serbia started a chain reaction of alliances which in four years destroyed the Austrian-Hungarian Empire fragmenting into five new countries, and losing territory to two other countries The Empire was not only destroyed but suffered losses of 90% of the men mobilized for the conflict. Austria-Hungary declared war on Serbia, in what was intended to be brief and limited war quickly escalated when Imperial Russia came to the aid of Serbia. The German Empire mobilized when they saw Russia mobilizing and declared war on Russia. The Republic of France an ally of Fig 3.. Political Cartoon 1914 Russia was then obliged by treaty to assist her against Germany and Austria-

Hungary. Germany attacked France through Belgium pulling Britain and her colonies Credit Wikipedia into war. Later in the war Japan, Italy and the United States would enter on the side of the allies. It was a slippery slope greased by jingoism, nationalism, imperialism.




Fig 4 European boundaries in 1914, Credit hamptonhighhistory.files.wordpress.com

There were several wars between the countries of the Europe over this scrap of land or trade rights. Nothing was too big or too small, that the Empires wouldn't intrigue about. Natural allies Britain and Prussia became direct competitors after founding of the German Empire in 1871. Both the British and Germans ploughed much of their countries wealth into a Naval Race, every technological advance was countered by the other.

Britain and France had long been enemies, in 1854 France and Britain came to the assistance of the Ottoman Empire which was attacked by the Russian the year before. Most of the fighting was done on the Crimean Peninsula by the armies of Britain, France, Turkey against Russia, who sixty years later would find Britain, France, Russia allies against Turkey. The Balkans was a powder keg, the fuse was lit in Sarajevo but the fuel was provided by the endless power politics of the countries of Europe both big and small, including: 1. the desire of most European countries to have overseas colonies; 2. unification of Germany; 3. the appearance on the world stage by the USA after the Spanish American War; 4. the British and German naval race; 5. the defeat of Russia by Japan in 1905; and 6. global trade competition all add fuel to the fire. The empires of



Europe were a patchwork quilt of ethnic groupings. There were Fig 6 All roads lead to conflict, Credit euro-webonline over seventy-five languages spoken by the subjects of the six European great powers and of the thirteen lesser ones. The borders cut through the homeland of ethnic groups causing friction amongst the groups and their governing authority and between countries who felt they had a vested interest in protecting these groups cutoff from their countries. The desire of nationalist groups to have their own independent homeland was used by countries to intrigue against other countries or absorb smaller countries. Ethnicity and Imperialism were the black powder into which the match of Sarajevo was thrown. We only have to look at the area today to see that not much has changed. Edd. Mc Arthur
