Pat is a Winnipeg based art historian, writer and management consultant in the arts and not-for-profit sector. Pat is Project Lead for the Buhler Gallery and was the director of The Winnipeg Art

Gallery (1999 - 2004) and the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria (1980 - 1999).

She has recently been honoured with the appointment of Adjunct Professor at the University of Winnipeg, 2011 - 2014, where she teaches 20th

She has curated many exhibitions and lectured widely on a variety of topics, specializing in the contemporary and historical art of western Canada.

Joanne DiCosimo is originally from Winnipegosis, Manitoba. She was the Executive Director of The Manitoba Museum for nine years and went on to join the Canadian Museum of Nature in Ottawa in 1997. Her major achievement, while there, was the founding of the Alliance of Natural History Museums of Canada in 2004. This dynamic network now comprises 16 natural history museums, zoos and aquariums that work in concert to preserve and interpret the natural world and to educate and inspire people about Canada's remarkable natural environment.

This year's banquet will be held at the <u>Delta Winnipeg</u> where we will enjoy an exquisite buffet while we honour some of the AMM's

founding and long term members.


AMM 40th Anniversary

Ask a Conservator

Q) Our museum is located in an historic house in rural Manitoba. When we checked on it last fall after closing it up, there was a swarm of ladybugs inside on the curtains, doorframes and windows of the south side. How can we get them outside again? And how did they get inside in the first place?

A) Coccinellids, also known as Ladybugs, are outdoor insects with an adult lifespan of 2-3 years. At the end of the summer they look for a warm, protected place to overwinter. Buildings that are near woods and fields are a logical choice to a ladybug. They are attracted to light-coloured houses or houses with nice warm southern exposure and will swarm onto sun-warmed structures during the fall. Many older buildings have small cracks and gaps around windows, under doors and between siding slats. The ladybugs find a way inside where they gather in groups to reproduce and hibernate. If you see one in a house in the fall, there will most likely be others.

If the ladybugs have been hibernating inside your historic house and the temperature rises due to a sudden warm spell or the house being heated for a seasonal event, the ladybugs may think it's spring and emerge. If you discover them, you have two choices: leave them alone or remove them.

Ladybugs eat only insects and are not harmful to museum collections. They will find their way outside when spring arrives. You may have a housekeeping task as there will probably be a number of dead ladybugs to clean up, killed when the temperature dropped before they could re-enter hibernation mode, or when the air became too dry.

If you do want to remove them before hosting the annual Christmas levee, vacuuming them up is probably the safest and easiest method. You can use a shop vac with a clean bag, and release them outside in another protected area such as an outbuilding.

If you are going to vacuum them up, be aware that ladybugs protect themselves when threatened by secreting a yellow fluid that is bad smelling and foul tasting. If they become alarmed, as they may be while being vacuumed up, the fluid may stain light coloured surfaces such as wallpaper or textiles.

Another removal method is to purchase or build a ladybug trap, though this may not be fast enough when there are hundreds of them milling about on your curtains. Pest control businesses sell ladybug traps but you can make your own and have it ready to go when the problem arises. Instructions can be found on the internet at www.ehowcom/how_4812414_black-light-ladybug-trap.html

Whatever method you use to remove the ladybugs, the pheromones that they release to attract others can linger inside your historic house and continue to attract other ladybugs. Cleaning may not be thorough enough to remove all traces of the pheromones, so sealing up the spaces around windows and doors, and the cracks in damaged siding is necessary to keep them from getting back inside.

Mould Miseries?

Le Musee de Saint-Boniface Museum, St. Boniface

Dr. Philippe Mailhot, director of Le Musee de Saint-Boniface Museum was honoured at the Canadian Museums Association's annual awards dinner as one of 37 recipients of the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal. Dr. Mailhot was recognized for his role in helping to preserve Franco-Manitoban cultural heritage, and his contributions to the field of museology in Canada.

Legion House Museum, St. Boniface Major renovations to the Museum took place in the fall of 2011 with the objective of the Library and Archives now opened to the general public. The Archives Library had 172 research requests and accessioned 313 books, documents and photographs into the Collection.

In the New Year, the Museum received some special donations including 14 uniforms that are currently worn by the Canadian Forces including a sniper's smock. Another donation of note is a uniform worn by a local St. Boniface resident who joined the RAF in June 1918. The uniqueness of this donation is that it is the first pattern worn by the RAF and is olive green in colour. It is considered a scarce uniform and few exist in Canada.

Manitoba Electrical Museum, Fort Garry

The month of May was Wonder Juice month at the Electrical Museum. We celebrated Manitoba's birthday by recognizing one of Manitoba's greatest gifts: Water power or "wonder juice" as we like to call it! Discover the first uses of this wonder juice and why it has become one of Manitoba's greatest natural resources. Have a hair-raising experience with the Van de Graaff generator and explore the production of high voltage electricity.

July and August are Louie's Family Fun Days at the Electrical Museum! Whether stepping aboard an electric streetcar, or pushing the buttons of a giant robot, guests will enjoy learning about electricity. Louie's Family Fun Days also features a

variety of specialized activities for large groups. Groups can enjoy the *Play it Safe* game, *Louie Bean Bag Toss*, the *I Spy Electrical Safety Hunt*, *Louie Matching Game* and much more.

The Manitoba Museum, Exchange District

In March, the Museum marked the passing of celebrated diorama artist Clarence Tillenius (1913-2012) with an exhibit titled Wildlife: a Tribute to Clarence Tillenius, featuring nine original paintings and six sketches. Tillenius was responsible for many of the museum's famous large mammal dioramas, including the bison hunt, polar bear and caribou migration.

The Museum's latest travelling exhibit, *Circus! Science Under the Big Top*, ended its run in early April. During the interactive exhibit's seven-month stay in Winnipeg, more than 20,000 visitors walked the tightrope and performed trapeze-style flips, tested their knowledge of circus lingo, learned about animal communication and dressed up like human cannonballs, clowns and bears.

May was an exciting month at the museum. Canadian astronaut Jeremy Hansen visited on May 1 and spoke to school groups, members of the public, and staff about the astronaut selection process, and his training for an upcoming mission.

Representatives from the Institute for Canadian Citizenship were in Winnipeg to announce the museum's participation in the Cultural Access Pass program. The Cultural Access Pass permits new Canadians to visit cultural institutions across the country free of charge for one year to learn more about the culture and history of their new home.

Each year, the museum honours a Manitoban whose philanthropic and community leadership has positively affected the lives of people across the province through its Tribute Dinner. This year's dinner was held on May 10th in honour of Mr. Kerry Hawkins, founding Chair of the CentrePort Canada Board of Directors. Proceeds from the event will be used for conservation and restoration of the Nonsuch and the Hudson's Bay Company Museum Collection.

The Museum celebrated Manitoba Day in a big way! Manitoba Lotteries Corporation sponsored the festivities, providing free public access to the Museum Galleries, Science Gallery and Planetarium. Costumed interpreters engaged visitors in the Museum Galleries, and an impressive line-up of notable Manitobans participated in panel discussions throughout the day. Manitoba Day also marked the opening of an exhibit commemorating the 200th anniversary of the

Red River Settlement. In total 4,324 people joined the celebrations.

The Manitoba Museum is proud to recognize the achievements of its staff and volunteers. This spring, three members of the museum family were honoured for their hard work and dedication. In March, longtime volunteer Ed Dobrzanski, was awarded the Paleontological Research Institution's Katherine Palmer Award for his outstanding contributions to the field of palaeontology as a non-professional palaeontologist. Ed is the first Canadian to win this award. At the Canadian Museums Association Awards Dinner in Gatineau, CEO Claudette Leclerc was one of 37 museum professionals who received Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medals. Claudette was honoured for her significant contributions to the heritage, scientific learning, and cultural life of Winnipeg and Manitoba. Volunteer Gary Day was awarded the inaugural Winnipeg Tourism Award of Distinction for Volunteer of the Year.

Mike Jensen, who works at The Manitoba Museum, is making his fourth consecutive trip into the Arctic with the Students On Ice Arctic Youth Expedition program. The Students on Ice Arctic Youth Expedition 2012 represents a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for youth to expand their knowledge about the circumpolar world, and to gain a new global perspective on the planet, its wonders, and its present and future challenges. Mike is the sole Manitoban representative.

Transcona Historical Museum, Transcona

The Museum just opened its new 2012 - 13 exhibits, celebrating the 100th Anniversary of Transcona. Our exhibits include *Transcona's Passionate People: Celebrating 100 Years, Transcona Sports Hall of Fame, Transcona Cenotaph* and more. Our exhibit opening was held for members and special guests on the 100th Anniversary of Transcona, April 12th. The exhibits opened to the public on April 13th. To celebrate Manitoba Day the THM hosted our Archaeology program from 1 - 4 on Saturday, May 12th. Visitors learned about archaeology and got to participate in a small dig.

There are some new faces at the THM. Carolyn Sirett is our new Assistant Curator, she started at the museum in February 2012 and is a graduate of the *Collections Conservation and Management* course offered at Fleming College. Erin McIntyre is taking over as Curator for Alanna Horejda, as she is on maternity leave. Erin has a Masters in *Museum Studies* from the University of Toronto. The THM has exciting events planned for this summer; our annual KidsQuest scavenger hunt, expanded Drop-In program and a walking

tour program. Check out our website for more details.

Winnipeg Police Museum, Westwood Jack Templeman, curator of the Winnipeg Police Museum, was one of five recipients of the 2012 Lieutenant Governor's Historic Preservation and Promotion Award. These awards are presented annually to "...people who have rendered prolonged, meritorious service in the preservation and promotion of Manitoba's history and heritage."

Training Program

Two more courses are being developed to be added to the Certificate Program in Museum Practice (CPMP). Those courses are *Museums and Facilities* and *Museums and Education*. They should be ready for their respective premiers this fall.

The courses currently in the CPMP are: Collections Care & Preventive Conservation, Collections Management, Exhibition Design, and Museums and the Community. The last course to be worked on and added to the line-up will be Organizing and Managing Museums.

Museums and the Community was debuted in March at La Maison Gabrielle Roy in Winnipeg. Nineteen people registered for the course and the evaluations show that the course was a hit. The instructors for this course were Ron Scott, former Executive Director of The Sam Waller Museum in The Pas (retired), and Tammy Axelsson, Executive Director of the New Iceland Heritage Museum. Both of them have a lot of experience with running a museum in a smaller centre and know how, and how important it is, to involve the local community.

Unfortunately, *Museums and the Community* had to be cancelled due to a lack of registrations when it was scheduled to take place in Winnipegosis earlier this spring.

Exhibit Design was held in Beausejour in February, much to the delight of its 16 participants. This course has been a VERY hot commodity since it was reintroduced to the curriculum with registrations reaching capacity the first three times it was held. Unfortunately, it had to be cancelled when scheduled to take place in The Pas due to a lack of registrations.

All in all evaluations show that participants are well pleased with the courses we're offering and they're looking forward to the latest additions.

Award Winners

The Lieutenant-Governor's Award for Historical Preservation and Promotion was established by the Honourable Philip S. Lee in 2011. The 2012 awards were presented at a ceremony on May 10th at Government House.

Jack Templeman was recognized for his prolonged service to Winnipeg through his work at the Winnipeg Police Museum and the Naval Museum of Manitoba, and the preparation of a comprehensive book on the history of the Winnipeg Police Service.

The Canadian Museums Association's annual awards dinner added a touch of royalty this year. Thirty seven museum professionals from across Canada were presented with Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medals on April 25th in Gatineau.

Joanne DiCosimo, former CEO of The Manitoba Museum and the Canadian Museum of Natural History, was recognized for her ongoing contributions to museum management and for furthering the interests of museums of natural history. Current CEO of The Manitoba Museum Claudette Leclerc was honoured for her significant contributions to the heritage. scientific learning, and cultural life of Winnipeg and Manitoba. Dr. Philippe Mailhot, director of Le Musée de Saint-Boniface Museum was acknowledged for his role in helping to preserve Francomanitoban cultural heritage, and his involvement in the field of museology in Canada.

In March, long-time volunteer Ed Dobrzanski, was awarded the Paleontological Research Institution's Katherine Palmer Award for his outstanding contributions to the field of palaeontology as a non-professional palaeontologist. Ed has been an important contributor to the museum's field work and research programs for 20 years, and is the first Canadian to win this award.

Volunteer Gary Day was awarded the inaugural Winnipeg Tourism Award of

Distinction for Volunteer of the Year. As a volunteer host, Gary shares a wealth of knowledge about the Nonsuch with visitors, while wearing his own handmade period costume. At after-hours conferences and special events, Gary entertains local, national and international visitors acting as a shining ambassador not only for the museum but for the city and province as well.

Manitoba Day 2012

This year 12 museums let us know about their planned activities to celebrate Manitoba Day. They were: 26th Field Regiment, Fort Garry Historical Society, Fort la Reine, Jewish Heritage Centre, Manitoba Crafts Museum & Library, Manitoba Historical Society, Musée des pionniers des chanoinesses, New Iceland Heritage Museum, Sipiweske, The Manitoba Museum, Transcona Historical Museum, and the Western Canada Aviation Museum.

The names of these museums went into a draw for a free full AMM conference registration. The winner of the draw was Musée des Pionniers des Chanoinesses. This year's conference will be held in Winnipeg on October 12 & 13 and will be extra special as it'll be celebrating the AMM's 40th anniversary.

PBS PSAs

Three museums joined the AMM in purchasing some co-op advertising on PBS. 26th Field Regiment, Jewish Heritage Centre, and the Transcona Historical Museum all submitted images to be used in the PSAs.

The AMM has purchased advertising on PBS to increase awareness of Manitoba Day since 2009. While there aren't any hard numbers available to track the effectiveness of these PSAs we do know that visits to our website peaks significantly every time we start running them.

The busiest three months for our website is April, May and June. May is the busiest month. It has 40% more visitors than June, which is the second busiest month. The most visited pages are the home page, picture gallery, museum directory and course information.

As well, this May 30% of the Google searches for our site were with the words "Manitoba Day". We do seem to be getting the word out and it would seem to coincide with the PSAs running on PBS.

Other museums, seeing the benefit of inexpensive television advertising, have begun to purchase PBS PSAs on their own.


